
Where Dreams Come True



Larry Moore (#50), OL, Monte Vista HS in 1994, with no offers out of HS at 6'2" - 255, gained weight and strength while at GC, became an All-State lineman as well as Academic All-American. He turned down several DI offers and went to BYU where he became an All-WAC center. He signed with the Colts and later the Redskins and Bengals. He's one of the smallest OLs in the NFL, retired last year.



In 1993, "Tiny" Utulu (#73) came to Grossmont after graduating from Helix High School. He started both years here and was a part of a team in 1994 led by QB Tom Karlo that began an unprecedented number of wins by Grossmont teams that continues today. The Joe Roth Memorial

Joe Roth was the key to Grossmont's first state championship in 1974. He was a JC All-American and scholarshipped to Cal, became an All-PAC-10 QB and was to be #1 in the 1978 NFL draft. He died of a fast growing cancer weeks after his senior year. Cal still honors him at a game each year.



Cody Gocke is the first O-lineman in the 30-year history of the "Joe Roth Award" to receive the honor. He won it not only because of his outstanding skills shown, but he also "displayed Joe's characteristics of leadership, humility, and class." Cody was projected to earn a scholarship to DI university but because of the stringent 5-year participation rules of the NCAA, he played for an excellent DII school in 2007 and 2008, Ft. Lewis State of Colorado.



Coach Ken Wilmesherr has a great reputation of developing offensive linemen. He has 28 years of coaching experience at the high school

and collegiate level. In Wilmesherr's two years at Grossmont College he has developed one JC All-American, had two Academic All-Americans, and three all conference linemen. In the last two years, seven of his linemen have received scholarships to four-year universities. Wilmesherr graduated with Honors and received a Bachelor of Arts Degree in Social Science from Chapman University in Orange, CA.



Coach Wilmesherr's philosophy is, "The strength and success of every team is based on the strength of the offensive line."




