
What is Student Engagement?

...the amount of time and energy students invest in meaningful educational practices

...the institutional practices and student behaviors that are highly correlated with student learning and retention Research shows that the more actively engaged students are—with college faculty and staff, with other students, and with the subject matter they study—the more likely they are to learn and persist toward achieving their academic goals. Student engagement, therefore, is a valuable yardstick for assessing whether, and to what extent, an institution is employing educational practices likely to produce successful results—more students across all subgroups achieving their academic goals.







- Most community college students are enrolled part-time. Many students, even full-time students, work nearly full-time.
- Connected colleges effectively connect with their students and encourage them to build the relationships — with faculty, staff, other students — that are essential to student success.
- Studies consistently show, for example, that community college students who participate in orientation programs are more likely to be engaged in their studies.
- Forty percent of all first-time freshmen enroll at community colleges.
 Additionally, 43% of all African-American college students and 52% of all Hispanic students are enrolled at community colleges
