

Honor Due for Four on College Faculty

EL CAJON — Four faculty members at Grossmont College have been selected to appear in the 1971 edition of "Outstanding Educators of America."

They are A. Lee Brown Jr., a history and political science instructor; Irma "Trudy" Hill, mathematics; Marj Hyde, art; and Frederick Stollenwerk, English.

The four were nominated by administrators at the college for their civic and professional achievements.

Brown, a member of the social sciences faculty since 1969, earned bachelor's and master's degrees from San Diego State College and has completed

course work for his Ph.D. at the University of Minnesota.

An avid treader with an interest in mountain climbing, Brown is married and the father of one child.

Mrs. Hill did undergraduate work in mathematics at the University of Akron and received her master's degree from the University of Colorado.

She and her husband, Clyde, who is on the staff at the San Diego Zoo, have three chilren and live in El Cajon.

Mrs. Hill taught at Grossmont College the year it opened and returned again in 1967.

Originally from Utah, Miss Hyde joined the faculty in 1961 and is chairman of the art department. She holds two degrees from the University of California at Berkeley.

One of Miss Hyde's current duties is to serve as a member of the college's budget construction committee.

Stollenwerk has taught a wide range of subjects, including Spanish, Latin, history, English and psychology. He received his bachelor's degree from St. John's College and his master's from Immaculate Heart College, both in California.

He and his wife, Dorothy, have seven children and live in Spring Valley. Stollenwerk has been on the English department staff since 1965.
