## Fond Farewell for Departing Grossmont College President

Grossmont College President, Dr. Ted Martinez, Jr., was honored with a dinner and ceremony on January 20 at Mission Trails Regional Park. This impromptu event was occasioned by the GCCCD Board's decision on December 23 not to renew President Martinez's contract. Dr. Martinez had served as Grossmont College president since 1999. Although his contract does not expire until this June, he has stepped down from his position, which is being filled temporarily by Dean Colli, the college's vice president of academic affairs since 1999.

Nearly two-hundred faculty, staff and students attended this warm, bitter-sweet occasion to show their support and appreciation for his "innovative and inclusive leadership at Grossmont College."

Pat Murray, representing the Classified Senate, presented him with a similar resolution. The Grossmont College Foundation presented him and his wife, Lydia, with Foundation jackets and roses for Lydia. Dr. Martinez then thanked the attendees for their support and received a long, standing applause. Supporters lined up throughout the evening to thank him personally and to wish him well.


## Hats off to Bill Bradley



the book ended. Tom Wolfe's writing does that to you. As for my second warning, I still hope that there's more than a little hyperbole in his descriptions of rampant drug use, casual sex and sports idolatry on his imaginary ivy-league campus of Dupont University (and yes, I do rank sports idolatry as an equal with drugs and casual sex on my list of 'undesirables').

The story begins in Sparta, a small town in the mountainous area of North Carolina, where Charlotte, brilliant and attractive, is finishing high school and is awarded a scholastic scholarship to prestigious Dupont University. Despite her scholastic aptitude, Sparta's isolated, impoverished environment and her unworldly parents have not prepared her for life in a co-ed dormitory at a big name university. And as you might have guessed, her room mate is a wealthy and snobbish prep school girl from the Northeast.

Charlotte discovers early on that parties, fraternity guys and jocks are the main pursuits of her roommate and her friends. It's more important to be 'cool' than to be smart, and the friends you choose determine your success or failure in campus social life. She discovers the power that jocks command and the way courses and grades are managed to ensure that star players aren't disqualified academically. And she discovers that sex is the number one topic on everyone's agenda, both to talk about and to engage in. This alien world and her first time away from home at first overwhelm her, but she is determined to succeed. She is Charlotte Simmons.

The various campus types – the frat boy, the jock, the party girl, the socially isolated intellectual – are caricatures, but they are made real by Tom Wolfe, as they each face obstacles and deal with them (or not), in ways that keep you turning the pages. I believe it's one of Wolfe's better books, maybe approaching his <u>The Right Stuff</u>, the best novelized account of our first seven astronauts that's been written.

respected as a Dean because he recognized and responded to faculty members' desire to serve the students with an excellent education.


Bill finished the evening with a series of observations on his life-long search for a career and lessons learned.

- 2. From Sports "All you can do is all you can do." ... Lesson learned "This can be used as a rationale for not completing a job that you gave your best shot."
- 3. From the Job "If tasks pile up and you wait long enough

Mildred Berry GC Counseling Office Clerk 1968-1993

Millie Berry passed away on Monday, November 21, 2005. She had been living at the Chase Care Center

in El Cajon following a hip injury in January, 2005. Millie was born at home in Stella, Missouri on February 12, 1923. Survivors include her daughter, Karon Eiter; son, Wayne Berry; four grandchildren; and four great-grandchildren.

Millie moved to National City with her parents at the age of eighteen and worked at a restaurant just across the street from where she met her future husband, Lawrence Berry. They married on December 7, 1941, Pearl Harbor Day. After raising a family, she came to Grossmont College in 1968, where she made many close friends, took up ballroom and square dancing, and was known for the bag of Snickers candy she always had in her desk.

Harry Cousineau died on Dec. 26, 2005, following a lengthy illness. He was born in Garden, Michigan on November 1, 1920. He

served with the U.S. Army during WWII and the Korean War. He is survived by his wife, Jean, his brother, Bill, and three daughters and a son.

The following is from a long-time friend of Harry, retired GC Counselor, Bill Hansen:

I first met Harry Cousineau some fifty years ago (1955) when we were both teaching at Grossmont High School. From the day we met, and through the ensuing years, I found Harry to be a man of highest integrity.

He had a passion for helping others. He came in contact with literally thousands of students, teachers, staff members and the public. With all of these contacts, I never heard him say a demeaning word about any of these people.

Harry's main concern was for the students. He said the college was built for the students and that everyone else was employed to help the students to the best of their ability. He was always digging into his pocket to help a student, or a student's family in a time of need.

I remember a student left a backpack in Harry's office and ask if Harry would watch it for him until he returned. The student returned ten years later to say hello, and there was the backpack with all its contents waiting for him.

Harry had a zest for life and enjoyed life each and every day. He was a true friend to many, and he will be missed because he was "one of a kind."



Mike Evans GC English Instructor 1969-2003

Mike Evans died on January 22 this year of pneumonia, a complication resulting from Alzheimer's disease which he's suffered from the past several years. His body was donated to UCSD for medical research. Mike was born in Bakersfield, California on June 28, 1942. He is survived by his wife of 27 years, Siu Fong, and by his daughter, Lui Guojing, who is now 25.

Mike lived just a few hundred feet from Grossmont College, so he could often be seen walking to and from work. In addition to walking, he loved to swim and also worked out regularly at a local fitness club. His wife, Siu Fong, said that Mike's greatest attribute was that he was an exceptionally wonderful husband and devoted father who attended church regularly. Siu Fong taught the first classes in Chinese at Grossmont College and continues to teach there now.



**Barbara Farina** GC Learning Resource Systems Specialist 1977-2000

Barbara Farina passed away Wednesday, February 22, 2006, at home after a 2-year battle with cancer.

Barbara was born March 5, 1938, in Chicago and spent her high school years in New Buffalo, Michigan, where she met and married her husband of 48 years, John Farina. Together they moved to San Diego in 1959. Barbara was a student at Grossmont College, graduating as school valedictorian from the Library Technology Program in 1977. She began working in the Grossmont Library as a student worker and in 1977 began her full-time employment as a Multi-Media Technician; as technology in the library grew her position developed into that of Systems Specialist. Barbara retired after 23 wonderful years.

Barbara was an active member at Our Lady of Grace Catholic Church assisting in the development of the school's library from 1969 through 1978. She also was a founding member of the Catholic Women's Club.

Survivors include her devoted husband, John Farina; 2 loving daughters, Carolinn Torwick and Nadra Farina-Hess; son-in-laws, Gregg Torwick and Alan Hess; grandsons Tyler and Lyle Torwick; and brothers, Douglas, Robert, and Laurence Trepany.
