The Grapevine at the time.

With a tradition of keeping up-todate, the editors, in consultation with the Benefits Office have made the following "Green" executive decision: In order to save a few trees, conserve energy, fight global warming and reduce district effort and expense, henceforth The Grapevine will be delivered via email attachment to retirees who have email addresses listed in the Retiree Directory. If you would like to help us in this effort and your email address is not published, or if your email address is incorrect in the Directory, please contact Debbie Lyttle at Debra.Lyttle@gcccd.edu and provide your current email address. Those of you without email will continue to receive hardcopy via the US Postal Service. Anyone who has a listed e-mail and loves the look and feel of hardcopy delivered at the pleasure of the USPS is welcome to continue receiving the hardcopy, but you must tell us so. Again, contact Debra.Lyttle@gcccd.edu

Publishing the last three issues using Adobe Acrobat (.pdf) and distributing them by e-mail to a list of up to 37 retirees and district employees has been quite successful. The advantages of an electronic edition are many. The Adobe version, unlike html, provides an exact duplicate of the printed and mailed version. The electronic version is available 2-3 weeks earlier than the

hardcopy; also, print and pictures can be enlarged on your screen. Adobe Acrobat also has Search and Go To functions, which make it easy to navigate through the pages. It will also contain "hot links" so that referenced web sites and email are only a mouse click away.

A paperless edition will allow us to expand our audience to other interested parties at virtually no expense. If you want to carry your copy with you to Tahiti or the "reading room," you can print it with a mouse click or two. I suspect that most of you are already familiar with Adobe Acrobat, but if not, a free Adobe Reader can be downloaded from: http://www.adobe.com/products/acroba t/readstep2 allversions.html

The E-version of *The Grapevine* will also contain bonus material additional pictures and text. The copy for each issue of The Grapevine requires judicious pruning to fit on eight pages; now we will be able to close articles with, for example, "For more on Muriel and Norman Owen's cruise around The Horn, read the Second Press in this edition. We've included a sample Second Press page in this edition.

The fraction of retirees with listed email addresses has grown from 3% in 1998 to 31% in 2000 and now stands at 175 or 75% of our listed retirees, so the "Green" contribution will be significant. We thought about having you return a card or form, but that sort of defeats the push for paperless that we're trying to make. I urge you to update your email address with Debbie and join us in continuing to modernize the Grapevine and keep the maximum amount of news flowing to all interested parties.

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

Grossmont College Selects New President



The Governing Board voted 5-0 to approve a three-year contract for Dr. Sunita Cooke, who begins the job July 9. She was one of four finalists who visited the

campus last month and participated in public forums. Dr. Cooke is married and has a 9-year-old son.

While interviewing for the job of college president, Dr. Cooke, 44, shared her story of coming from India to the

United States when she was 5 years old. Her family arrived in the country with just \$40, she said. Fortunately, her mother had a job waiting for her as a nurse at a Dallas hospital.

"Science runs deep in my family," said Dr. Cooke. She earned her doctorate in biology from Georgetown University. Her older brother is a chemical engineer. Her older sister is a physician. Cooke said she found her calling in education through science, starting as a biology teacher at Montgomery College, north of Houston. She was also director of the college's biotechnology institute and dean of natural sciences and health professions. The past two years, she has

been associate vice chancellor of work force development for the North Harris Community College District, which includes Montgomery College.

Grossmont-Cuyamaca Community College District officials and faculty members said they were impressed with Cooke's communication skills and academic background. Aware of the tensions between various factions in the GCCCD, she said she looks forward to being a healing force.

Jacqueline (Jackie)
Hall
GC Political Science
Instructor
1962-1985

Jackie Hall died at home on April 7, 2007,

after a three-month bout with cancer that had returned in spite of a much earlier surgery. She was hired at Grossmont College in 1962, back when classes were offered at the Monte Vista HS campus (the current campus opened in the fall of 1964) and taught both social and political science classes. She had earned her AB and MA at the University of California, Berkeley.

Jackie was a very private person and consequently it was difficult to find out much about her off-campus life, both before teaching at Grossmont College and after retiring from the college. Retiree Mary Ann Beverly, a friend of Jackie, submitted the following information.

"Before my friend Jackie Hall retired, she was undergoing some health problems. I marveled at her ability to endure pain while looking forward to retirement. She kept herself strong by getting involved with the stock market, current events and the arts. She attended many events at the Athenaeum in La Jolla because she continued to have a thirst for learning. Her interests included literature and all types of music, especially opera, for which she was a proud season ticket holder. Her pastimes included volunteering for the Chamber Music Association of La Jolla and the Dixieland Organization. A special 'taste' for her was first class dining, such as being a member of a gourmet club.

Professor Hall graduated from UC Berkeley with honors. At one time that we know of, she was married to a tennis pro. Having been an activist, she appropriately willed her worldly possessions to the Ralph Nader Foundation."



Don Shannon GC History Instructor 1965-1997

Don Shannon died on June 2, 2007, from complications related to Parkinson's disease and

other medical conditions. He had been residing at the Country Villa convalescent facility in La Mesa for the past six years, following a serious hip injury and his later diagnosis of Parkinson's. He was pre-deceased by his wife, Doris, about ten years ago. He is survived by his two sons, Pat and Kevin Shannon, their wives Elsa and Linda and by two granddaughters and two grandsons.

Don was born in Los Angeles, California on October 20, 1928. He grew up in San Diego and Alhambra. His family was poor; sometimes living with relatives while his father was away working on odd jobs during the Depression years. After graduating from high school, Don served in the Army Air Corps as an MP in the Philippines from 1945-47, guarding Japanese in a POW camp. Using the GI Bill, he earned an AA from San Bernadino Valley College, an AB from University of Redlands and an MA from Long Beach State College. Don married Doris Simpson in 1951.

He taught history at both junior high and high schools in the Riverside area before beginning his career at Grossmont College in 1965. At Grossmont College he taught American history (both North and South American) full time until his retirement in 1997. He was a dedicated and popular teacher and had many friends among the students and faculty during his tenure. He was particularly interested in the history of San Diego. He wrote a book on that topic, Mission to Metropolis: A History of San Diego, published in 1981. He also authored A Comparative History of the Americas, A Short History of San Diego County, and co-authored San Diego with Lee Peterson. He worked with four other colleagues to initiate the journal, "Community College Social Science Quarterly." His courses on California and San Diego County were especially popular and often taken by other staff at Grossmont College because of the very informative

and entertaining field trips.

He and Doris were especially friendly with an eclectic mix of faculty families, including Lee and Barbara Roper, Tom and Rosemarie Scanlan and Don and Joan Scouller. They all met regularly for many years, alternately hosting gourmet dinners, often with 'surprise guests.' Don's hot tub was the place they all most often celebrated New Years. This same group often traveled together and coowned a cabin in the Laguna Mountains. (Please see Obituaries, Lee Roper, in November, 2006 Grapevine.)

Partly because of his interest in history, Don traveled extensively through the Americas with his wife, Doris, oftentimes accompanied by both sons. He visited virtually every country in South America and made many trips to Mexico. In addition to his interest in history, Don played both acoustic and bass guitar. He memorized a number of folk songs from Mexico, a country he visited often, because he was quite fond of its culture, its cuisine and its people. Don was also fond of Irish music. He memorized the lyrics to many of their classic folk songs and sometimes entertained his friends by singing an Irish ballad or two. These were occasionally inspired by 'a wee bit of Guinness, me lads.' He enjoyed most folk music, but especially the songs of protest, whether against the English or against the war in Vietnam. He especially liked the Irish rock band, U-2.

Don Shannon was a life-long Democrat and was a cofounder of the Congress of Racial Equality (CORE), a civil rights activist group. He was forever a champion of the oppressed. He was a big man, definitely one of a kind, with a very big heart. He fought his infirmities during these final years with exemplary grace and humor. ts



May 11, 2007, in San Diego. On Friday, May 18th. Barbara was born February 11, 1917, in San Diego. A darling with auburn hair and blue-green eyes, she won an Ideal Screen Baby contest in 1920. Her family moved to Hollywood, where she acted in a dozen films, including Speed Girl, Doll's House, and Bachelor Daddy.

Educated at Hammond Hall, Brownmoor School (Santa Fe), and Sawyers Business College, Barbara went to work as an executive secretary for the FBI. She met Marine MSGT Sylvester "Sy" Eugene Strand, of Donnelly (MN), on a train to San Diego in 1942; and they married November 14, 1945, in L.A. They enjoyed many of their 61 anniversaries in their honeymoon city of Acapulco, and traveled often to Europe.

They lived in El Toro, Memphis, Woodbridge (VA), El Cajon, and La Mesa (since 1968), where their children all graduated from Grossmont HS. She also worked at Grossmont College, where she graduated with honors in 1980 and retired in 1983. She founded Grossmont High School's Bridge Marathon scholarship program. She and Sy hosted hundreds of

English-as-a-Second-Language students in their home.

Surviving are her husband; her five children, Carl, Eugene, Thomas, Marcia, Penny; eight grandchildren, Krysta, Ashley, Stephanie, Craig, Tiffany, Sean, Kahli, Jamar; six great-grandchildren, Alec, Kimber, Audrey, Barbara, Ananda, Sylvie; brother Owen Maier and his wife Julie and their three children, Robert, David, Christopher.
