


Hailed by NPR as a "literary badass" and a "master storyteller with a rock-androll heart," Luis Alberto Urrea is a prolific and internationally celebrated writer who uses his dualculture life experiences to explore greater themes of love, loss and triumph. A 2005 Pulitzer Prize finalist for

nonfiction and member of the Latino Literature Hall of Fame, Urrea is the critically acclaimed and best-selling author of 16 books, winning numerous awards for his poetry, fiction and essays. Born in Tijuana to a Mexican father and American mother, Urrea is most

recognized as a border writer, though, he says, "I am more interested in bridges, not borders." Urrea earned an undergraduate degree in writing from the University of California



at San Diego, and did his graduate studies at the University of Colorado-Boulder. After serving as a relief worker in Tijuana and a film extra and columnist-editor-cartoonist for several publications, Urrea moved to Boston, where he taught expository writing and fiction workshops at Harvard. He also taught at the University of Louisiana-Lafayette. Urrea lives with his family in Naperville, IL, where he is a distinguished professor of creative writing at the University of Illinois-Chicago. This event is funded
