## Presidents Forum...

The President's Forum is a chance for our campus to gather information, and reflect on current hot topics. Grossmont President, Dr. Nabil Abu-Ghazaleh, held the first piece of his two part series on April 25th at Griffin Gate. In this conversation, he and other campus leaders, gave updates on enrollment, outreach, and engagement, as well as a review of the results of the professional development/campus climate survey.

Factual data given by Dr. Michael Reese, Math, Natural Sciences, ES, and Wellness Dean, gave us a black and white picture of where Grossmont stood in enrollment numbers, including some solutions to help meet the gaps. According to Dean Reese, we will be short of our goal by 1,030 Full Time Enrolled Students (FTES). He offered 4 possible solutions to close the gap by summertime. 1) Offering additional summer sections for which there are student demands, 2) rescheduling existing summer sessions to align census to be within this fiscal year, 3) Convert existing sections from positive to daily attendance (which basically means a lot more tracking of students on a daily basis), 4) and lastly, increasing the fill rate-also known as filling up our classrooms! We also learned there might be help in the way of summertime childcare. Through a recent collaboration with federal Head Start programs, retention of our parent student population will hopefully increase in summer.

Heriberto Vasquez kept things upbeat with a video and picture montage of the faces who represent Grossmont College in the community. Even if your preferred method of communication is not social media, you can't help but feel the excitement of seeing Grossmont College out in the community. In just 9 months, the Outreach team has evolved into a dynamic and spirited team. They have assisted in completing over 1100 student applications to date. We also heard from Susan Berry, our college's new Student Engagement Coordinator, on her wonderful ideas to create community amongst our students through various projects, one being a campus food pantry. She hopes to have that available to students as early as mid-summer.

Lida Rafia, Associate Dean of Student Success and Equity, presented results from the most recent survey regarding campus culture and climate. A couple of key findings from the survey was realizing the lack of support from management felt amongst Classified Staff to engage in Professional Development. Faculty also expressed frustrations in not knowing where to take students in midst of crisis feeling as if there are so many resources available but not knowing where to find them In general, the feedback showed there was obvious missed connections amongst college individuals and departments. There is a clear yearning for a strengthening of ties—at all levels, between individuals and between departments.

Amongst this raw feedback given about our campus climate, Dr. Nabil pointed out something that

is not taken for granted---that "Nobody agrees that we do not care about our students. Nobody stated that people here just do not care". So now, here we are at the beginning of answering the question, what is next?

As you can see, there are great opportunities ahead, for all of us. For every Classified Staff, faculty member, and administrator, there is a lot of work to be done. Committees to join, students to engage with, and staff to encourage. We are an OUTSTANDING organization. We really are. Our organization is composed of people who WANT to work for an institution of higher learning-that alone has infinite potential. We did not wake up one day and decide that education really changes lives. Our own experience in education echoes behind our mission statement. I firmly believe in the power of our own education and experience, as transformative as it was for us-it will be the catalyst to unveiling our own students' potential.



# Construction is coming! Construction is coming! Construction is coming!

It's such an important point that we had to say it 3 times. If you were not aware before, consider yourself aware now. At the Town Hall presented by President Nabil Abu-Ghazaleh on May 9, 2017, we glimpsed into what will become a decade of construction. In actuality, Construction has already been here with the installation of the new chiller plant, and some of the other infrastructure in preparation for the other construction projects.

We are building for the future and it will begin in September with the groundbreaking ceremony of arts & theater complex. There are many phases and as a project comes to an end, and new one will begin. The architect was also on hand to describe the design of the new buildings and how the new arts center will be a jewel of the campus.

This means that there will be a lot of changes happening. For starters, a temporary village will be set up in parking lot 5 for offices, class instruction, and labs for students. So that instruction can continue during this process. A concern that was brought up in the presentation was about parking since parts of Lot I South will be occupied with construction machinery and parking lot 5 will be taken by interim swing spaces. As some of you may know from construction of the parking structure that happened before, parking may be limited as it affected 25-30% of capacity before. Since we now have a parking structure, parking in peak times only 9% of capacity will be affected. We have more spots available now than we did before and there are about 4550 spots on campus today. There will be an ongoing parking utilization analysis as construction happens.

We invite you to raise any concerns you may have about the construction, and if you have experienced working in an interim space to share your experience with those in the facilities task-force so we can proactively address them before they become issues. The goal of the committee and the campus is to communicate as much as we all can to be proactively addressing issues before they become issues. Be on the lookout for more information!


# The 18th Annual Recognition Awards Ceremony...
