In The Immoral Life of Henrietta Lacks, author Rebecca Skloot discusses the profoundly unethical Tuskegee syphilis experiments in which public health researchers recruited hundreds of black syphilis patients but denied them the curative penicillin treatment and information about the cure, which led to the deaths and infection of the patients' spouses and children. The Tuskegee syphilis study was eventually a driving factor for the development of informed consent regulations for human subjects in clinical trials in the U.S. Henrietta's Hela Cells also played a part in the National Institutes of Health's decision to require recipients of its funding to have their studies approved by ethical review boards. -Sarah Everts, "Cells of Controversy"
