BEFORE YOU BEGIN, GET ORGANIZED!

- Organization is the key to an effective scholarship search.
 Try some of these suggestions:
 - Use one calendar for all your scheduling and deadlines.
 - Collect and organize your financial records.
 - Obtain a copy of your academic transcript.
 - Make and keep copies of everything you submit. (You never know if the scholarship program might lose part or all of your application!)
 - Send originals via certified mail to ensure the documents are received.
 - Keep all your information organized in a filing folder, box, or cabinet.
 - In order to organize your scholarship search and avoid junk mail in your day-to-day email, create an email specifically for scholarship usage.

 - OR yourname.grossmont@yahoo.com

WHEN SEARCHING FOR SCHOLARSHIPS...

- Input as much information as possible into search sites and we searches.
 - The more information you provide, the more tailored the scholarships are to your unique situation.
 - Be as specific as possible
- Thousands of dollars of scholarships are available every year, and the Criteria for each is different.
- Begin searching for scholarships as early as possible. Don't start looking for scholarships the semester you need them.
- Many applications open in fall and close in January, so don't forget to keep looking once classes start.
- Be thorough in your search to avoid scholarship scams
- Be Cautious about "It's guaranteed!"
 What's usually guaranteed is search
 "results"—not scholarship money.
- Never stop searching!!

- Avoid Scholarship Scams!!
- The FTC cautions students to look for tell tale lines:
 - "The scholarship is guaranteed or your money back."
 - "I just need your credit card or bank account number to hold this scholarship."
 - "We'll do all the work."
 - "The scholarship will cost some money."
 - "You've been selected by a 'national foundation' to receive a scholarship" or "You're a finalist" in a contest you never entered
- Look into the background of the scholarship to verify that it is from a reputable source.

APPLYING FOR SCHOLARSHIPS

GENERAL APPLICATION SUGGESTIONS

START EARLY

- Start looking for scholarships the semester before you need the money
- Pick Up your Application early
- Make sure to start and give yourself enough time to complete all materials
- Start looking for instructors to write letters of recommendation.

DO RESEARCH

Look into how each application is judged

SEND OUT REQUESTS FOR APPLICATIONS AND INFORMATION

- Request applications be sent to your scholarship email or address.
- Request information about the scholarship to prepare your materials.

TIME MANAGEMENT

- Give yourself time to put together an essay, have it revised, and time to rewrite the essay.
- Give your Instructor time to write your letter of recommendation.
- Give yourself leeway when putting together the application packet so that you are not rushing to turn the application in on the deadline.

APPLY

- Send in your application early enough that you will not miss the deadline.
- Use a checklist if necessary to ensure your applications are complete

WHEN APPLYING FOR A SCHOLARSHIP...

- Identify and Meet the sponsor's goals.
 - Read through all the scholarship information watching for details and clues about what the sponsor's formal and informal requirements.
- Be completely honest about your grades, experiences, memberships, qualifications, family finances, and other information.
- Carefully follow instructions.
- Strictly observe deadlines, and even strive to submit your applications early.
- Proofread everything before you send your application in—look out for typos.
- If you have to handwrite the application, BE NEAT!
- Follow directions when asked to write an essay
 - Some sponsors don't ask for a biographical essay, but rather a more academic essay, based on a specific topic.
 - If a sponsor asks for an essay on a specific topic, make sure to research that topic.
 - Use examples and write the paper in correct format – knowledge is more impressive if papers are written in MLA or APA format.

- Make sure to participate in extracurricular activities.
 - Surprisingly, most scholarship committees do not simply choose the student with the highest grade point average (GPA) or SAT score.
 - Instead, most scholarship providers are equally interested in a students extracurricular activities.
 - Is he involved in his community?
 - Does he have an after-school job?
 - What hobbies does he have?
- The scholarship coordinators are interested in giving the award to the person they consider the most wellrounded student.
- Grades are important, but they are only half the story.
- Therefore, it is to your advantage to participate in extracurricular activities.
- Volunteer at your local library.
- Find a hobby.
- All these activities will help make you stand out to scholarship sponsors.

GROSSMONT SCHOLARSHIP APP.

- Do not leave any line blank.
- Make sure to be as specific as possible when writing your major and career goal in.
- List all extra-curricular you are enrolled in at Grossmont College, as some scholarships are dependent on special programs.



GROSSMONT SCHOLARSHIP APP. CONT.

- Do not leave any line blank. If they are not applicable, a line or N/A is appropriate.
- List any on or off campus activities including volunteer work from within the past 2 years.
- List any awards or honors you have received within the past 2 years.
- You must attach are a personal essay and a letter of recommendation.
- The personal essay will be explained in more depth later.
- Sign and Date to complete the application.

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LETTER OF RECOMMENDATION

- Request this from a professor, boss, or someone who knows you well professionally.
- Request letters of recommendation at least three weeks in advance
- More than one letter of recommendation is encouraged.
 - This page can be copied for more letters for the student.
- Please do not use letters that are more than a year old
- Request new letters of recommendation for important scholarships!

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WRITING A SCHOLARSHIP ESSAY

WRITING A SCHOLARSHIP ESSAY

1. Read & Follow the Directions

- If there are specific questions required, be sure that you address each one clearly.
- Make sure your personal statement is typed and adheres to the guidelines

2. Outline your Essay – Brainstorm

- Outlines help provide focus and they structure the essay because they organize your thoughts.
- Highlight Your Major Accomplishments
- Discuss A Particular Difficult Adversity You Overcame
- Consider Your Extracurricular Activities
- Brainstorm before you write!

3. Be Personal and Specific

- Share Your Story
- •Sponsors want to know who they are giving money to, Not just that the money is needed
- •Use examples to personalize your essay and demonstrate the points you want to make.

4. Have a Main Point

- •State your Thesis right off.
- Reiterate your main point throughout the essay
- •Stay on topic
- Restate your main point in your conclusion

5. Know Your Audience

- Personal statements will not necessarily be applicable for each application.
- Write an essay that meets the requirements of each organization and scholarship application.

WRITING A SCHOLARSHIP ESSAY CONT.

6. Creativity and Originality Stand Out

7. State Your Goals Clearly

• Sponsors are investing in your potential, so inform them of your purpose and you plans

8. Give Yourself Enough Time

- •Spend the time to write about yourself and strengthen your essay
- Give yourself enough time to edit and make corrections

9. Edit and Proofread

- •Look for grammar and spelling mistakes, Ensure that the structure and logic flow without being redundant.
- Check the Content to ensure you have a complete essay.
- Have several strong writers read and proofread. Ask someone you trust to review your essay as well. Different perspectives will add to your essay.
- •The Grossmont College English Writing Center has writing tutors to assist students.
- Writing Center is in LRC Room 10-119.

10. Reuse your scholarship essays!

- If you can use an essay multiple times, you save yourself time. You can recycle an entire essay and use it over if it applies to the question being asked.
- •Use different parts of past personal statements or essays to create entirely new essays. A few paragraphs from old essays with a few new sentences added to them is an entirely new essay.

SCHOLARSHIP INTERVIEWS & JUDGING SCHOLARSHIP APPLICATIONS

HOW ARE SCHOLARSHIP APPLICATIONS JUDGED?

Leadership

- "Good leaders are made not born. "
- •Leadership within work, community, or school is an effective way of pushing yourself above the rest when applying for a scholarship.
- If you have leadership experience or activities emphasize them.

Academics

• GPA, Attendance, and attitude about school all affect academics

Special Circumstances

- Include Special Circumstances in your essays. Special Circumstance are things that you have overcome
- Hardships, Disabilities
- Special Circumstances are things that made you into who you are.
- •They make you stand out from the crowd.
- Touch on special circumstances, But do not make your whole essay about your special circumstances.
- Explain how they made you who you are.

Community Service

- Any service you provide without monetary or academic compensation.
- Neighborhood Association
- School Volunteer
- Tutoring
- Campus Participation
- Church
- Verification may be required

Recommendations

- Ask a professor, boss, or someone who knows you well.
- More than one letter of recommendation is encouraged.
- •It is not suggested to use letters that are more than a year old

Creativity

- Make your application unique and interesting.
- •The goal is to make your application stand out from others.
- Creativity will do enhance the uniqueness!

SCHOLARSHIP INTERVIEWS

- The interview is one of the most nervewracking aspects of applying for scholarships.
- Most will not require an interview, but some will.
 - If you have reached the interview process, then you should know that you are a strong contender to win the award. The judges were impressed enough with your resume, essay, transcript, and letters of recommendation to take the time to interview you.
- Prepare for the interview with these basic questions:
 - Name your strengths and weaknesses
 - What are your long-term goals?
 - What would you do with the money?
 - Who do you admire the most and why?
 - What do you want to do after college?
- Judges will ask you questions about yourself, so you should be able to articulate your answers quickly during the interview.

- The day of your interview, plan to arrive at least 15 minutes early. There might be traffic or some other issue that will delay you, so plan accordingly.
 - Lay out your outfit the night before so that you can quickly get dressed and out the door.
 - A "business casual" outfit might be sufficient. For boys, that means a button-down shirt, belt, dress shoes, and slacks. Women should wear a button-down blouse and dress pants or a skirt. Your outfit should be conservative enough to wear to a church. Avoid wearing jewelry, unless it is a simple pair of earrings or a watch.
- Head to the bathroom before you walk in to your interview
 - Check your hair and outfit.
 - Spray some breath freshener in your mouth if you need it.
- Take a deep breath, gather up your documents, and head into the interview with a smile.

A FEW LAST MINUTE TIPS

WHAT NOT TO DO WHEN APPLYING FOR A SCHOLARSHIP

- Avoid Sounding Like A Singles Ad
 - "Hi, my name is Ann and I'm 18 and I'm studying Art History..."
- Avoid Excessive Use Of Big Words, Foreign Words, Slang, Or Jargon
 - There is nothing wrong with a few well-placed big words or foreign words, but trying to replace every safety-net with a cordon sanitaire becomes somniferous after a while.
- Avoid simple writing mistakes and habits
 - Do not write in ALL CAPITAL LETTERS or all lower case letters.
- Do Not Start Every Sentence With The Same Word
 - "And, I want to be a teacher. And, it would be cool to have every summer off."
- Don't Be A Potty Mouth
 - Never use curse words ("four letter words"), insulting, derogatory, or abusive language.
- Remember the effects of Social Media in today's society
 - Many companies check social media such as Facebook and Twitter. If your actions undermine a scholarship essay, you are likely to be disqualified.

A FEW LAST MINUTE TIPS

- Be completely honest about your grades, experiences, memberships, qualifications, family finances, and other information.
- Talk to students who have already won the scholarships you're interested in, and find out what worked for them.
- Carefully follow instructions. If the application asks for a 500-word essay, make sure you don't exceed this limit.
- Strictly observe deadlines, and even strive to submit your applications early.
- Only apply when you meet the scholarship's requirements. If you know you don't, don't apply. It's better to spend time on the scholarships you know you qualify for
- Proofread everything before you send—look out for typos.
- Supplement your application with personal letters of recommendation.
- Find creative ways to present information about yourself.
- Follow up with a telephone call to make sure the organization received your application.
- Remember to send thank you notes. This small courtesy often has a disproportionately big effect.
